



**Research Question: How did trade and technology help the Sumerians build and maintain their cities?**

**Concepts:** Identity, power, change, care, conflict, fairness.

ENGLISH

Writing:

Our class reading book for this term will be 'Varjak Paw' by S.F Said. We will also be reading and watching stories from other cultures.

**Children will:**

- Use causal connectives to develop their explanations.
- Use their, there and they're correctly in their writing.
- Use organisational devices within non-narrative writing such as headings and subheadings.
- Evaluate and edit by assessing the effectiveness of their own and others' writing and suggesting improvements
- Use inverted commas in direct speech in their writing.
- Use reported speech in their writing.
- Continue to practise weekly spellings linked to the year 3 & 4 spelling list.

Spelling: We will be focussing on the statutory year 3/4 spelling list and the spelling rules/ patterns connected with these spellings.

Reading: We will use Varjak Paw to support comprehension skills. The children will also practice specific reading skills on a rotation 3-4 x a week using a range of shorter fiction and nonfiction texts/ extracts linked with ancient civilisations, sound, and music history.

MATHEMATICS	<p>Children will continue to practise their times tables daily in preparation for their times tables multiplication check in June. SCIENCE	<p><b>Sound</b></p> <p><b>Children will:</b></p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• identify how sounds are made, associating some of them with something vibrating</li> <li>• recognise that vibrations from sounds travel through a medium to the ear</li> <li>• find patterns between the pitch of a sound and features of the object that produced it</li> <li>• find patterns between the volume of a sound and the strength of the vibrations that produced it</li> <li>• recognise that sounds get fainter as the distance from the sound source increases.</li> </ul> <p><b>Animals including humans</b></p> <p><b>Children will:</b></p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• describe the simple functions of the basic parts of the digestive system in humans</li> <li>• identify the different types of teeth in humans and their simple functions</li> <li>• construct and interpret a variety of food chains, identifying producers, predators and prey.</li> </ul>

HISTORY	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• This term, children will be learning about one of the world's earliest civilisations, Ancient Sumer. They will explore when and where the Sumerians lived, and learn about key events in Sumerian history.</li> <li>• Children will investigate how the Sumerians built some of the first cities, focusing on the rise of urban life and the technologies that supported it. They will learn about important Sumerian inventions and developments, and consider how these helped people to organise, manage, and grow their cities.</li> <li>• The unit will also explore the importance of trade. Children will find out what goods the Sumerians traded, where these goods came from, and how trade routes connected different regions.</li> <li>• As part of their learning, children will be introduced to early writing systems, including Cuneiform. They will learn how writing was used for record-keeping and why it was important for managing cities and trade.</li> <li>• Children will also explore religion in Sumerian society, including the role of temples such as Ziggurat, as well as the work of priests and the importance of religious beliefs in daily life.</li> </ul>
